David Mann & Paul Moore Show

A painter of Native American figures and genre as these subjects would appear in everyday life, David Mann does extensive research on the clothing and background objects of his subject matter but does not show actual historical events.

Most of his Plains Indians are placed in the context of the mid to late 19th century before they were moved to reservations and could practice the rituals of their culture.



Paul Moore is a fifth generation Oklahoman and a citizen of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. In the past thirty six years, he has sculpted more than 130 commissions for numerous municipal, corporate, private and international collections.

His work is in the US Capital Collection, the Brookgreen Gardens Collection, the Oklahoma State Capital Collection, the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum, and the Smithsonian's National Portrait Gallery.

For the past 13 years Moore has been working on the Oklahoma Centennial Land Run Monument in Oklahoma City, one of the largest free-standing bronze sculptures in the world.


“Bellagio Village” by Bob Pejman




"Calling the Great Spirit II"

King Frosch Wine Tasting**


